3.2. Presentation, discussion, and possible action on Hotel Occupancy Grants.

JoBeth Wolfe, Conventions Manager, and Alex Aguero, Sports Manager, updated the Committee on the six Hotel Occupancy Tax Grant applications.

- 68th Annual County Auditors Institute — April 27–May 1, 2026, in the amount of \$10,000.
- 68th Annual VG Young School for County Commissioners Courts — February 17–19, 2026, in the amount of \$5,000.
- 47th Annual Property Tax Institute — December 16 –17, 2025, in the amount of \$10,000.
- Southwest Electrical Metering Association (SWEMA) — October 27–31, 2025, in the amount of \$15,000.
- Cavalry Soccer - 2026 Aggieland Classic — January 30–February 1, 2026, in the amount of \$10,000.
- Texas Hearing Aid Association — June 11–13, 2026, in the amount of \$5,000.

MOTION: Upon a motion made by Committee Member Rhianon Elizabeth Whitney and a second by Committee Member Paul Allen Loy, the Committee voted 9 for and 0 opposed, to approve all Hot Grant Applications presented.

3.3. Presentation, discussion, and possible action on an update from the Parks and Recreation Department.

Kelsey Heiden, Director of Parks and Recreation, provided a comprehensive update on the city's event-hosting capabilities, focusing on Wolf Pen Creek Amphitheater and Festival Site. She outlined the current limitations, including flooding, infrastructure constraints, and the need for modernization. The presentation included proposed upgrades such as amphitheater seating, food truck hookups, improved restrooms, and shaded gathering areas. Committee members engaged in discussion about the site's potential, the need for bold investment, and the importance of balancing community use with tourism-driven events. There was consensus that future planning should be data-driven and visionary.

3.4. Presentation, discussion, and possible action regarding a sponsorship for the Texas Music Scene.

Casey Barone, Visitor Engagement Manager, presented a proposal to sponsor the Texas Music Scene for \$100,000, which includes a 13-week TV and digital campaign, as well as one live concert taping in College Station. The committee discussed the potential benefits of the sponsorship, including national exposure, alignment with local branding, and opportunities for community engagement. Members emphasized the importance of local promotion, artist selection, and venue flexibility.

MOTION: Upon a motion made by Committee Member Jim Ross and a second by Committee Member Costa Dallis, the Committee voted 9 for and 0 opposed, to recommend approval of the sponsorship, and to explore ways to maximize its impact through strategic planning and partnerships.

- 3.5.** Presentation, discussion, and possible action on representation for the wayfinding working group. The Committee was asked to appoint two members to serve on the new Wayfinding Working Group, which will collaborate with the City of Bryan and other stakeholders to redesign directional signage throughout the area. Costa Dallis and Paul Allen Loy were nominated and approved unanimously. The group will be tasked with reviewing RFPs, evaluating signage design, and ensuring the new system reflects the identity of College Station while improving visitor navigation.
- 3.6.** Presentation, discussion, and possible action on data reports from the previous month. Jeremiah Cook, Assistant Director Tourism, presented a preliminary data report on hotel performance during the September 7 Texas A&M vs. UTSA football weekend. Despite high game attendance, hotel occupancy and average daily rates were lower than expected, especially compared to the previous year's Notre Dame game. The report highlighted that most attendees were from within a two-hour drive, resulting in fewer overnight stays. The committee discussed broader tourism trends, including the impact of weather events and the importance of strategic event scheduling. A full data report will be shared at the next meeting.

3. Agenda Items.

3.1. Presentation, discussion, and possible action on the steering of the Tourism Strategic Plan.

Jeremiah Cook, Assistant Director- Tourism, introduced the session by providing context on the strategic planning process and the evolution of the Tourism Readiness Index and Demand Driver Scorecard. He emphasized the need to benchmark College Station against peer cities and highlighted the city's current position as slightly below average in several tourism readiness categories.

Consultants from Jones Lang LaSalle (JLL), including Dan Fenton, Shirin Jafari, and Abigail Herrod presented findings from peer university case studies and outlined a roadmap for transforming College Station into a premier tourism destination. The peer university case studies showed that Texas A&M's current decentralized approach to event management can be a barrier to growth. Peer institutions like Ohio State and Notre Dame have adopted centralized or partially centralized models that streamline booking, improve coordination, and generate \$8M–\$20M in annual event revenue.

Key pillars for the strategic plan included:

- **Academic Conference Strategy:** To achieve this, Visit College Station should inventory academic departments and associations to identify conference opportunities and establish a dedicated academic conference sales and support team. By targeting niche areas where Texas A&M has national or international recognition, Visit College Station can develop bundled packages for hotels, dining, and attractions, making the offerings more attractive. Finally, presenting the strategy to Texas A&M leadership will formalize collaboration and ensure alignment with the university's goals.
- **Enhance Student/Family Visit:** To archive this pillar, Visit College Station should work with the Texas A&M Visitor Center to develop curated itineraries for visitors, aid with digital tools, and college event and dining calendars for distribution to families.
- **Event Management Partnership:** Establishing a joint event coordinator role, implementing a unified calendar to prevent scheduling conflicts, assessing venue needs and promoting city venues, and working with Texas A&M Special Events and Athletics to improve facility access are key strategies in our event management partnership.

Committee Member Erin Jones left at 3:42 pm

The Committee recessed for a 5-minute break at 4:05 pm and resumed at 4:10 pm.

- **Faculty and Staff Engagement:** Develop curated itineraries and digital tools for visiting families, create a "Community Expert Network" to support faculty recruitment, and build a digital relocation guide and hospitality program for new hires.
- **Event Matrix and Signature Event Development:** To maximize tourism impact, brand alignment, and economic returns, utilize the Event Matrix to evaluate and prioritize events effectively. Additionally, establishing a Signature Event Task Force dedicated to creating a significant recurring event that garners regional or national attention.

Committee members discussed the feasibility of these strategies, emphasizing the need for realistic expectations, resource allocation, and university collaboration. There was consensus to proceed with refining the proposed pillars and return with implementation details, including staffing, metrics, and funding models.

3.2. Presentation, discussion, and possible action on data reports from the previous month.

Jeremiah Cook, Assistant Director- Tourism, presented the August 2025 tourism data. Hotel revenue was down 16.9% year-over-year, with occupancy and ADR also declining. He noted that September was showing signs of improvement and emphasized the importance of evaluating fall performance holistically. Committee members discussed the impact of Texas A&M's football schedule and broader economic trends on hotel performance.

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The Committee requested the staff to bring an update on the following items:

- Visitor Center refresh
- Large Event Sponsorship

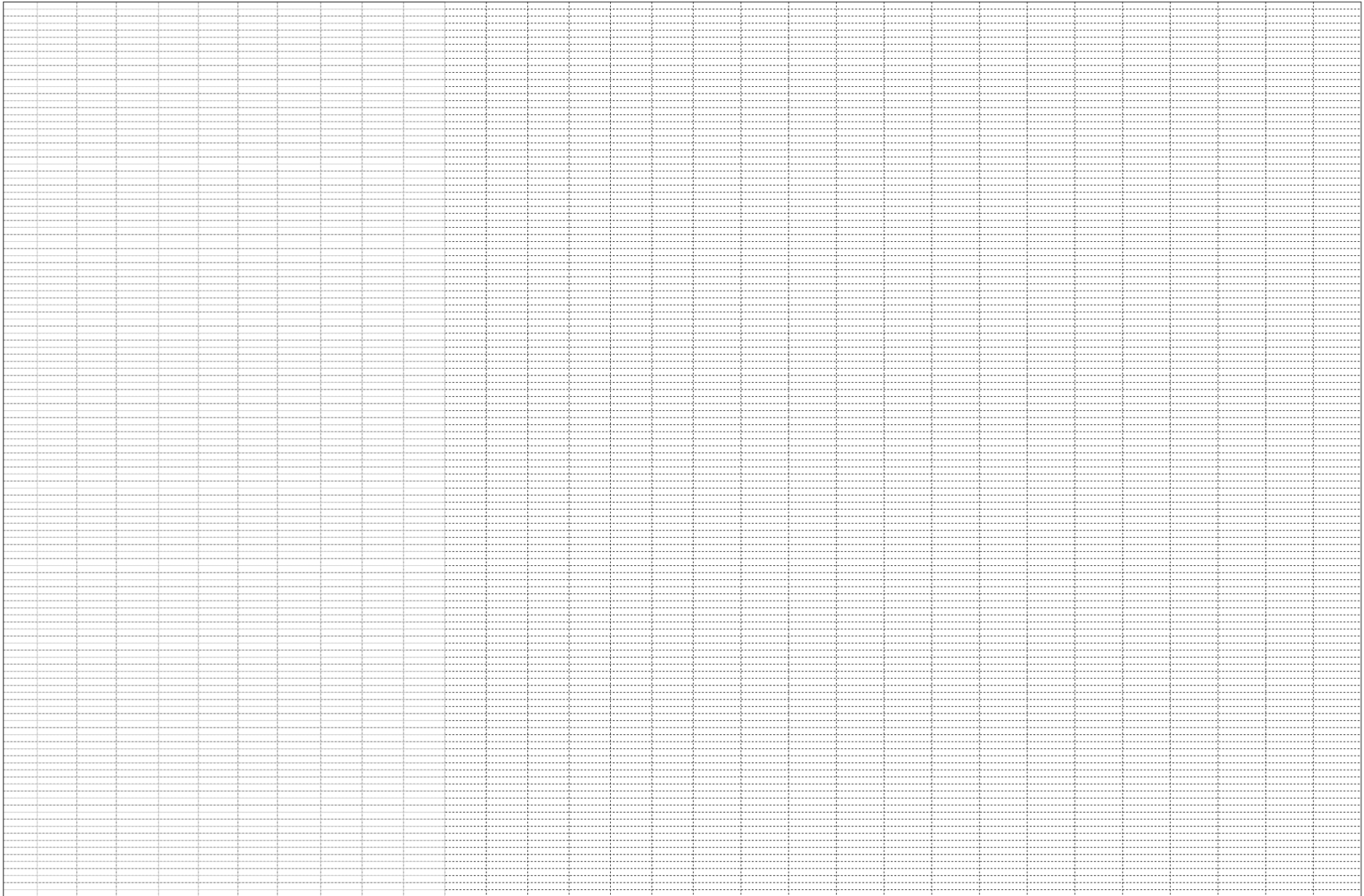

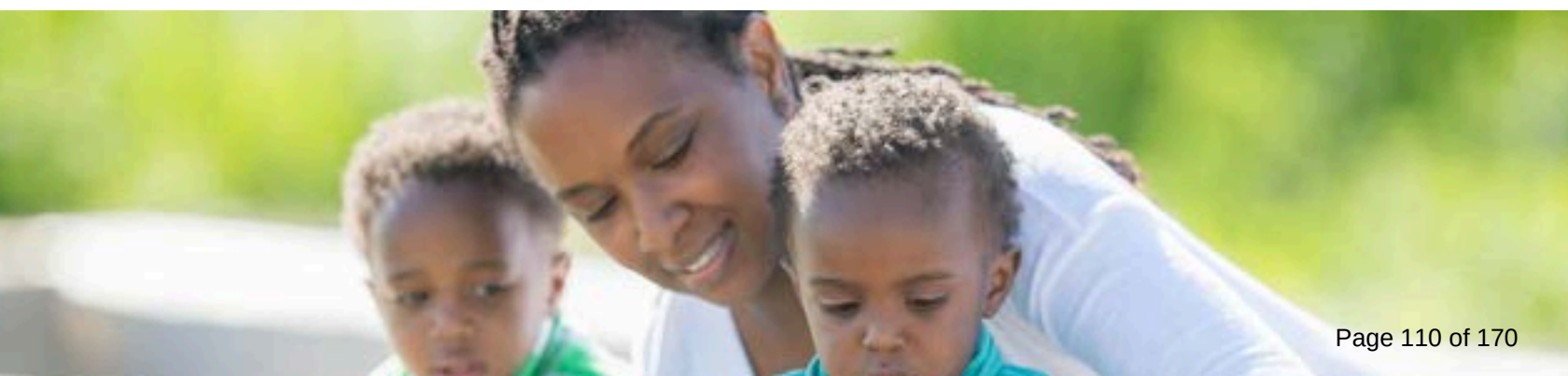

- **Blue Spaces and Connection to Nature**

- Presenters: Dr. Jay Maddock, Director-Center for Health & Nature, Professor – Texas A&M University School of Public Health
- Location: Brazos Park East Boat Ramp - South
- Time: 1-4
- This workshop will include a kayak paddling trip down the Brazos River in Waco. Stops will be made along the way to discuss the health effects of blue space, accessibility, water safety (especially as it relates to children) and caring for our waterways. By the end of the session, participants will be able to discuss the health benefits of blue spaces, analyze opportunities for creating blue space programming, and create safe and effective ways to get children into blue spaces.
- This workshop involves an active kayak trip. Participants should be able to kayak for up to an hour and should be prepared to be outdoors and on the water in December.
- If there is inclement weather that prevents kayaking, the workshop will be held as a walking tour of blue spaces.

- **Changing Perspectives: Shadow Day - Forest School activities for ages 18 months to 5th grade. Pond Water Testing, Spots, & Tour.**

- Presenters: Mr. Peter Holmstrom, Ms. Camree Schraeder & Mrs. Melissa Skrhak - Summit School
- Location: Summit School, 3701 Mockingbird Ln, Lorena, TX 76655
- Time: 1-4
- Join us at Summit School for a dynamic day of experiential learning. Upon arrival, registrants will tour the campus with the Head of School, and then smaller groups will rotate through the following sessions. Upon arriving at our expansive 35-acre campus, our Head of School will guide you through our facilities. In Session 1, participants will engage in hands-on activities where adults experience learning through the eyes of learners, choosing between early childhood forest activities or upper elementary integration of science standards. Session 2A explores how farm animals enrich learning, followed by outdoor activities that can enhance daily toddler routines. Meanwhile, Session 2B includes a visit to the creek for sit spots and journal prompts designed to foster curiosity and connection with nature. In Session 3, participants venture to the pond to test water quality and observe microorganisms within the ecosystem. The day concludes with a Q&A featuring Summit School staff reflecting on the integration of forest learning into educational settings. Come discover how Summit School inspires outdoor education beyond traditional classroom walls!

- **Collaborating for Coastal Education: Chasing the Tide Learning Resource**

- Presenters: Anne Marie Fayen, Curriculum Developer for Chasing the Tide Film, Fayen Consulting
- Location: Mayborn Museum Complex, Baylor University - 1300 S. University Parks Dr., Waco, TX 76706
- Time: 1-4
- Description: Everyone in Texas is connected to the Gulf Coast. Join this interactive session to explore the K-12 learning resources that support the documentary series, Chasing the Tide. The learning resources highlight six themes from the documentary including: Ghost Wolves, Oysters, Kemp's Ridley Sea Turtles, Aplomado Falcons, Birds, and the issue of trash in our waterways. Test out learning activities yourself and identify how you can use these resources with your audiences. Anne Marie will share the in-depth details of the collaborative efforts that went into creating the Chasing the Tide learning materials, highlighting how conservationists and educators worked together to create accessible resources. Leave this session with practical ideas and tools to share the beauty and complexity of the Texas Coast with your audiences. - **Designing Natural Play Spaces in Urban Centers, Bienenstock Natural Playgrounds**

- Presenter: Adam & Jill Bienenstock, Bienenstock Natural Playgrounds
 - Location: Cameron Park, Redwood Shelter - 2300 Cameron Park Dr., Waco, TX 76707
 - Time: 1-4
- Participants will be coached to create their own natural playground designs out of sand and mini components all set to scale. We will start the design by using five basic elements: changing topography, creating pathways, and adding boulders, logs, and large trees. Next, natural playground components will be included in their designs to create areas that include art/creative play, dramatic play, science concepts, and areas that enhance social skills and collaboration. Participants will get a chance to present their models to the group while providing constructive feedback that will support the design principles, safety standards, and educational objectives presented earlier. Affordable ways to achieve these goals will be presented throughout. Specific attention will be paid to CPTED, ADA, ASTM, and CPSC Compliance. Operations and Maintenance for long-term sustainability and leveraging of current capacities will all be addressed as part of this modeling session.

- **Growing and Nourishing Healthy Communities by Sustaining Healthy Partnerships**

- Time: 1-4
- Participants will learn how Better Living for Texans (BLT) has partnered with local organizations to increase youth programming. They will be able to bring back new community partnership ideas and inspiration to their prospective counties and seek out the BLT Agent there for resources and opportunities to create new partnerships. Despite all the resources available in the area, there are still hundreds of homeless in Waco and many of them are young people. Mission Waco will share how they are reaching youth in a variety of programs. The group will journey over to Mission Waco's 'The Rock' and hear how GTG Outdoors is aiding in this effort. Then Urban Reap will discuss local Food Insecurity, Food Access, and Food Sovereignty during a tour of the Jubilee Food Market and walk through demonstration gardens to highlight how they are creating community engagement while also providing youth-centered activities and spaces. Everyone will walk one block over to tour the Waco Family Medicine Wellness Center to see where patients can exercise indoors by appointment or on the outdoor work out equipment at their convenience. Families can exercise together and be outdoors! Participants will also be introduced to the Junior Master Gardner's Learn, Grow, Eat, and Go Program. Everyone will participate in a Hands-On Cooking Demonstration and Interactive Lesson Example utilizing ingredients from the Community Gathering Space Garden sponsored by Waco Family Medicine. This is a teaching garden that is always accessible to the community. A little dirt never hurt! See ya there!
- Parking Location: Registrants will be sent an aerial view of the Parking Area a few days before the workshop because of minor construction.

- **Guided Forest Therapy Walk: Engage your senses, quiet your mind, and immerse yourself in nature**

- Presenter: Courtney Crim, Ed.D., Associate Professor, Department of Education, Trinity University, Laura Allen, Ph.D., Professor, Department of Education, Trinity University
- Location: Cameron Park at Lawson's Point - 2601 N. University Parks Dr, Waco, TX 76708
- Time: 1-4
- Description: Our bodies share the same elements as the beings we meet in natural settings. Humans are nature, but we have allowed ourselves to become separated. During this guided forest therapy walk, you will experience the effects of shinrin-yoku—the Japanese practice of bathing your senses in the surrounding forest. The trained certified forest therapy guides will help you slow down by using a standard sequence of invitations that deliberately move you out of your head and engage your senses as you reconnect with the world around you. They will provide multiple ways for you to experience walks so everyone can participate in a way that meets their needs. These walks are not strenuous and use gentle invitations to increase awareness, deepen connections, and elevate well-being. Honoring the spirit of shinrin-yoku, this experience will close with a tea ceremony featuring tea made from plants native to the forest. Participants will benefit firsthand how forest bathing can impact individual well-being which in turn benefits their educational interactions with children, experience invitations that can be transferred to their own contexts and examine research linking nature experiences to improved wellbeing. Please bring a water bottle and something to sit on.

Nora Schell educates students and the greater community about reservoir systems and water issues through outreach and will share problems and solutions for running a constructed Wetland. During this workshop participants will be introduced to the Bosque River Watershed and go on a tour of the Lake Waco Wetlands, focusing on the flora and fauna of the Wetlands. The tour will be in an open-air trailer ride around the Wetlands. Please wear proper attire, closed toe shoes, jackets, and/or rain gear.



- **The Power of Outdoor Play**

- Location: Dewey Park - 925 N. Ninth Street, Waco, TX 76707
- Time: 1-4
- Description: Much is known about the need for play daily in children's lives. What is less known is how to attract children and adults to the outdoors and create intrigue, curiosity, and an inviting social/emotional climate through different landscapes with different opportunities at schools, parks, and community settings. Presenters will introduce different strategies that have worked with the LiINK Project (in schools and communities) and Fort Worth Botanic Garden (in schools, community gardens, and teacher support). These include why the outdoors, school recess policies, and procedures, adult role during recess/play, weather guidelines, and equipment/loose parts for different landscapes to create an enticing environment for child and adult play. By the end of the workshop participants will be able to connect with reluctant adults where they are and allow them to change at their pace and they will be able to provide school, park, and community setting strategies that create an enticing recess/play environment for children and adults! This workshop is for anyone who wants to feel more comfortable helping others who are reluctant to be outdoors, need to understand why the outdoors is so important, and need to be more comfortable being in spaces that produce active, healthy, and resilient children and adults.

- **Waco Mammoth National Monument: Community Partnerships for Preserving and Protecting**

- Presenters: Christine Jacobs - National Park Service, Raegan King and Kaitlyn Holyfield- City of Waco Staff - MaybornMuseum-Baylor University, Priscilla Martinez and Hector Sabido - Waco Mammoth Foundation
- Location: Waco Mammoth National Monument - 6220 Steinbeck Bend Drive, Waco, TX 76708
- Time: 1-4
- Visit Waco Mammoth National Monument where the National Park Service(NPS) paleontologist will give a tour of an active excavation of Pleistocene Columbian mammoths. This phenomenal site is supported through a partnership with the National Park Service, City of Waco, Baylor University, and the Waco Mammoth Foundation. These partnerships are vital to the Monument, and representatives from all partner representatives will discuss their role in the partnership including different ways students interact with the site's resources. Each presenter will also provide some best practices and tips that may help develop new partnerships. Participants will have the opportunity to ask the panel questions about both the highlights and potential difficulties involved in developing partnerships. While there are often bumps in the road, sites like Waco Mammoth National Monument would not exist without the constant support of all partners. The hope is that participants will take these discussions home and begin brainstorming future partnerships to help students of ALL ages get more connected with nature.

As a result, calls for youth to balance out their Screen Time with Green Time have been increasing, but it's worth noting that younger generations may not feel comfortable spending time in nature, and may lack the confidence or experiential know-how to engage their attention span outdoors in technology-free ways. Participants will learn how to refocus their attention so that they can reconnect with nature in technology-free ways, leading to sustainable habits around getting more green time, less screen time, and improved wellbeing.

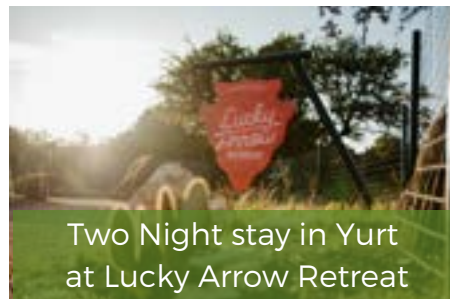

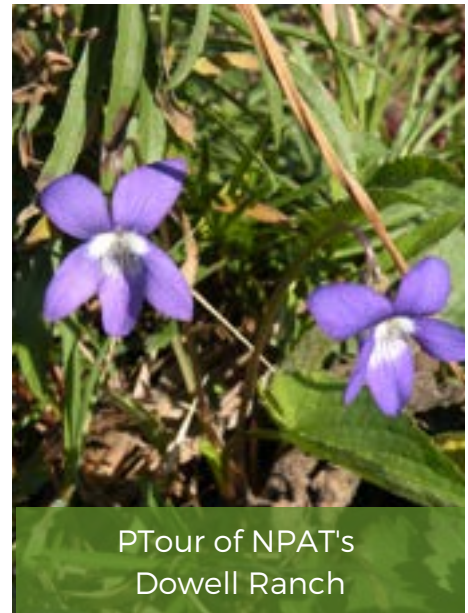

Subject: HOT Grant Discussion- Update

A Hotel Occupancy Tax (HOT) Grant is a grant that is meant to stimulate the economy by offering groups and event owners funding to bring events to College Station. **For Sports, the grant funding is utilized to entice new business and grow the current book of business. For conventions, the grant funding is utilized to entice new business and maintain large-scale events and/or events dependent on the grant during a need period.**

1. The following parameters were put into effect in December 2020.

a. Conventions/Meetings Breakdown of Funds:

Conventions/Meetings focuses on the number of room nights associated with the event.

Number of Room Nights	Stimulus
200	\$5,000
300	\$10,000
400	\$15,000

For every additional 100 Room Nights beyond 400, the stimulus will increase by \$5,000.

b. Sports Breakdown of Funds:

Sports focuses on the number of participants and expected spectators for each event. Sports also breaks down into Regional Event and National Events. Regional Events are defined as those events that a majority of the people are from the Texas area. National Events are defined as those events that a majority of the people are from around the country. National Events typically invoke longer stays and impact the economy in other areas like vehicle rentals, flights, etc.

- To be eligible for the stimulus, groups must show a history of participant/spectator numbers/room nights from previous events held.
- All contracts must be for the total number of room nights listed in the stimulus.
- Need dates will be considered for funding.
- All stimulus amounts are “up to” amounts.
- Media coverage and ancillary needs (vehicle rental, flights, etc.) will be considered in determining eligibility.
- Cannot include dates over Texas A&M Home Football Games, Texas A&M Graduations, or Texas A&M Family Weekend.

2. Current Process:

- Sales teams work with groups to bring events to College Station.
- Group applies for grant within the Foundant Grant Interface providing all pertinent event information including dates, anticipated room nights and anticipated attendees.
- Sales team, in consultation with the Assistant Director- Tourism, formulate recommendations to the Tourism Committee based on group needs and current parameters.
- Full application and staff evaluation is sent to the Tourism Committee.
- Tourism Committee makes final recommendation on Grant Funding to the City Manager.
- Following the completion of the convention or sports event, group will complete the post-event analysis in the Foundant Grant Interface.
- Stimulus will be sent.

Summary: On September 29th, the City Council received a presentation from Legends Global on a multi-event center. The following excerpt from the minutes of that meeting summarizes its contents:

Bill Rhoda, EVP Business Development with Legends Global, provided a presentation to the City Council outlining their business model and exploring potential opportunities for a multi-event center in College Station. The presentation provided the City Council with an opportunity to learn about possible approaches to a convention or multi-use facility and to engage in discussion regarding future possibilities for such a project. Mr. Rhoda explained that Legends Global (Legends) offers a complete solution for clients, covering building plans, acquisition, development, sales, and food and beverage services. Legends are unique in supporting clients from start to finish, assisting with planning and execution. Their services include financial market analysis, project development, and valuation for clients like universities. They help determine which facilities to build, such as arenas or convention centers, offering insights into size, revenues, expenses, and financing options. As an owner's representative, Legends will manage schedules and budgets, ensuring projects stay on track and within budget. They oversee construction, focusing on architects and contractors. Notable projects include: University of Kansas (KU) \$400 million football stadium renovation, Florida State's football stadium renovation, OU Arena project for the University of Oklahoma, Sofi Stadium's \$5 billion project for the Rams and Chargers, Rogers Centre's \$400 million renovation in Toronto, Superdome's \$550 million renovation during COVID, Buffalo Bills' \$2.3 billion venue opening next year.

In addition, ASM Global (ASM) is a global venue management company, and Legends is its largest client. ASM handles operations, security, marketing, tech, janitorial services, and more for sports and entertainment buildings. Their focus is on delivering projects on time and within budget while enhancing the guest experience to benefit clients financially. Collaboration with stakeholders such as cities, counties, and universities is crucial. ASM's expertise ensures buildings are optimized for operations, revenue, and guest satisfaction. They work closely with design and construction teams to address budget concerns and ensure seamless project completion.

In closing, Mr. Rhoda provided the following framework for a successful project:

- Establish a project governance structure early.
- Engage the contractor early — having the construction manager (CMaR) input on pricing, materials, schedule, constructability, and means & methods is critical to finalizing the budget and setting up the project for success.

- Finalize development agreement early and finalize financing, understanding any funding, reporting, and mitigation requirements necessary to include in architect or CMaR agreements and budgeting exercises. Completing later can impact the budget and schedule.
- Determine priorities, goals, and program early, i.e. sustainability and technology goals.
- Engage the concessionaire early in the project to determine the approach, equipment, and technology required.
- Engage sales & sponsorship early to finalize sales program and naming rights / founding partner activations, eliminating change orders and redesign later.
- Conduct peer reviews of design with other building operators and any leagues.

Summary: On July 30, 2025, the Tourism Committee reviewed the use of Hotel Occupancy Tax (HOT) funds for capital projects. They recommended capping the City's contribution to the Veterans Park baseball field project at the amount of HOT revenue the project is expected to generate over a 20-year period—approximately \$5 million.

On October 9, 2025, the City Council directed staff to further evaluate a proposal from Southern Roots for a new 80-acre, nine-field, all-turf baseball complex in the Midtown Business Park. The estimated cost of the project is \$55–60 million, with the City potentially contributing \$15–20 million and providing the land. During the same meeting, the Council also discussed how this proposal might impact the previously considered \$30–35 million expansion of baseball facilities at Veterans Park.

On October 24, 2025, the City Council directed staff to proceed with a public-private baseball development in Midtown Business Park and to discontinue plans for new field construction at Veterans Park. As part of this direction, the City will explore building the championship field itself—estimated at \$23 million—while Southern Roots would construct the remaining eight fields. This approach would reduce the City's direct capital contribution to Southern Roots to approximately \$12.5 million, bringing the total estimated cost for the nine-field complex to approximately \$35 million. Additional infrastructure expenses, such as streets and utilities, will be required to support access to the site.

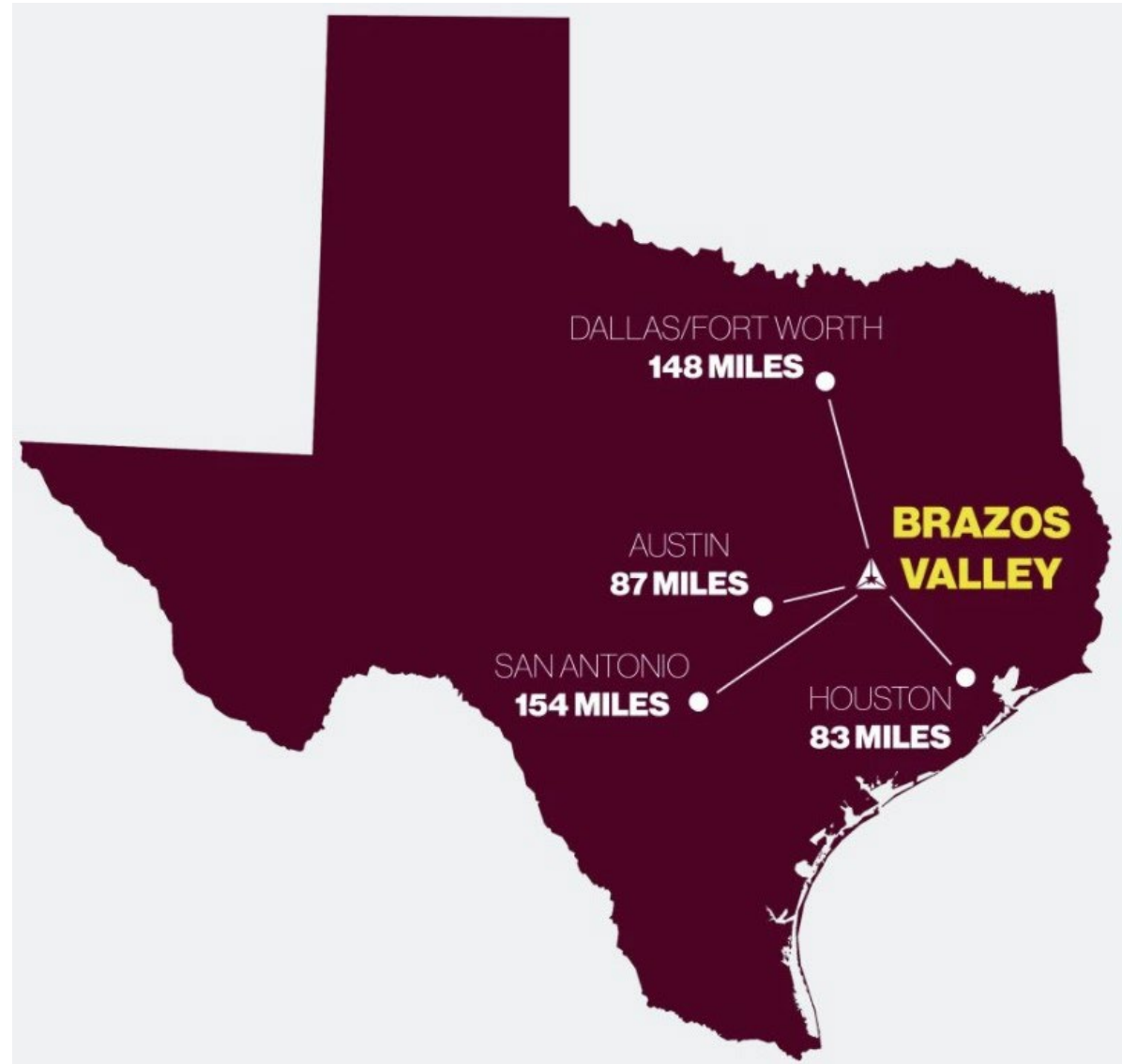

- **Land:** Donate 80 acres in the Midtown district (behind Costco) with an option to purchase +20 acres for future expansion.
